Havdalah Service





The National Jewish Committee on Scouting is pleased to present to all interested parties a series of basic religious services and resource guides. These resources are intended for use on campouts, in a Pack, Troop or Crew setting or as a Scout observance at a religious institution. They can be freely adapted to any specific situation.

HAVDALAH

Just as we proclaim the entrance of Shabbat "the day of rest" by making "Kiddush," so too we mark the exit of Shabbat with "Havdalah." Typically Shabbat ends when three medium-sized stars are visible in one glance in the evening sky. This time varies according to location and season.

The name Havdalah comes from the Hebrew word l'havdeel, which means to distinguish or separate. Havdalah is the service separating the Sabbath from the rest of the days of week, the sacred from the secular or mundane, between light and darkness.

It is a service normally conducted in the household, with the full participation of all family members. We frequently hold religious services on Saturday afternoon or early Saturday evening, if so the Havdalah service is appropriate for Jewish Scouts and Scouters at a typical scouting event.

This service is organized both for the practicing Jew and the visitor to our circle for the evening. Explanatory text and transliterations of the Hebrew text are provided to allow all to more fully participate.

To prepare for Havdalah, gather a kiddush cup with wine (at scouting events we use grape juice), a spice box with sweet-smelling spices, and a braided Havdalah candle. At Scouting events the Kiddush cup may be anything from a paper cup or juice box to a formal kiddush cup. Although the leader holds the formal "kiddush" cup at scouting events we usually provide individual "wine" servings so all may participate in the blessings and the refreshment. The spice box may be any sweet-smelling spices (cinnamon and nutmeg work nicely) in a simple or elaborate container and passed around as indicated in the service.

When everything you need has been made ready, gather everyone around and light the Havdalah candle. The youngest Scouts should hold the candle, kiddush cup, and spice box.

The Havdalah Service is Made Up of Five Sections:

Introduction

Our service begins with Biblical verses that praise God.

Blessing over the Wine

Wine symbolizes the joy of the Sabbath.

Judaism teaches us to transform the physical to the spiritual. Just as simple grapes were transformed into wine, so too we take pleasure in the spiritual renewal we have accomplished over Shabbat, and hope it will continue to grow throughout the coming week.

Blessing over the Spices

Spices are smelled so that the sweetness of the Sabbath will be carried over into the work week.

The Kabbalists tell us during Shabbat, we each receive an extra soul, or extra spiritual sensitivity. So as Shabbat goes away, so does the extra soul, causing us to feel faint. For this reason we smell some spices (spiritual smelling salts!) to comfort our soul at the loss of Shabbat.

Blessing on the Flame of the Braided Candle

Light is at the center of the Havdalah service. The braiding symbolizes the unity found at the end of the Sabbath. Since the blessing refers to "lights of the fire" in the plural, two wicks are used in one candle to enable one to extinguish them at the same time.

The Talmud says that when Adam was created on Day Six, he became very sad when he saw darkness setting in on Friday night. He thought perhaps the world was ending! So on Saturday night, God gave Adam the gift of fire. This is why we say the blessing over fire on Saturday night. The Havdalah candle represents the primordial first light of creation; new beginnings, a new commitment. We hope to extend the light of Shabbat into our week.

Conclusion

After saying the blessing, we make use of the flame by holding our hand near the flame and looking at our fingernails. When Shabbat comes in, we light a simple candle; yet, when Shabbat is leaving, we light a larger flame of intertwined lights, for now we had the experience of living with an additional soul and the opportunity that provides.

Preparation

Our service begins with Biblical verses that praise God as our saviour. Then blessings are recited over the wine, the spices and the candle. The service concludes with the Havdalah blessing.

The leader fills a kiddush cup with either wine or grape juice, until the liquid overflows a bit onto the plate below. This is symbolic of our desire for blessings to overflow into the week. Small cups of wine are handed out to each participant.

The leader lights the Havdalah candle (a braided candle with at least two wicks, or two candles held with their flames together). The candle is passed to the youngest child (or Scout) If alone, place the candle in a holder.

Participants can sit or stand, and but should not idly speak until the ceremony is completed. Holding the wine cup in the palm of the leaders (and participants) right hand, we read together:

Introduction

Hineh El yishuati evtach v'lo efchad. Ki Ozi vzimrat ya, Adonai vayahee li l'yeshua. U'shavtem mayim b'sason mi-mayanei ha'yeshua. La'Adonai ha'yeshua al amcha birchatecha sela. Adonai tzvaot imanu misgav lanu elohei yaakov sela.

Those present respond La'yehudim hayta orah v'simcha v'sason v'ikar. Ken tiyehah lanu.

Leader repeats and then lifts the kiddush cup and continues Kos yeshuot esah u'bshem Adonai ekra.

Blessing Over the Wine

Lifting the kiddush cup filled with wine



We will lift the cup of salvation, and call upon the name of the Lord.

Barukh atah Adonai Elohaynu melekh ha-olam, borei p'riy ha-gafen.


Blessed are You, Lord our God, Ruler of the universe, Creator of the fruit of the vine.

The spice box is passed around for everyone to take a sniff.



Blessing on the Flame of the Braided Candle

With the wine cup still in the left hand, the candle is raised by the youngest and the blessing over the fire (candle flame) is said:



בָּרוּך אַתָּה יֵי אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, בּוֹרֵא מִאוֹרֵי הַאֲשׁ.

Barukh atah Adonai Elohaynu melekh ha-olam, borei m'orei ha'eish.

Blessed are You, Lord our God, Ruler of the universe, who creates the lights of the fire.

Amen.

Those present cup their hands and hold them toward the flame of the candle so that their fingertips cast a shadow on the palm of their hands. In this way, the distinction between light and darkness is illustrated on their hand. We have been known to make shadow plays with our hands at our house.

Blessed are You, Lord our God, ruler of the world, who separates the holy from the mundane, light from darkness, Israel from the other peoples, the seventh day of rest from the six days of work. Blessed are You, Lord, who separates the holy from the mundane.
